Busty Jane on the move

Many of you will have noticed that the west door of Bunbury church has been out on operation for a couple of months and regulars will occasionally have felt the lack of central heating: all in a good cause.

The entrance and west end of the church are being reorganised to give two new multi-purpose rooms and improved access for wheelchair users. There will also be a toilet (for this relief much thanks!) and a small kitchen area, allowing for the more convenient and hygienic preparation of tea and coffee.

The two new rooms will be a great boon during services, when the various Kingdom Kids groups need more sound-proofed space, but will be available for any groups meeting in the church building. They have also been designed so that a second storey could be added in the future, if necessary. The changes should make the church building a much more flexible and modern meeting place,



without detracting from the historic architecture and beauty of the building. The work is due for completion in the next few weeks – we may even see the tarpaulins down by Easter.

One casualty of the changes is 'Busty Jane', or the statue of Jane Johnson, shown above. She has had to be moved from her modest position near the tower steps, to a much more obvious one on the north side. At one time Jane stood near the Communion

Table, but her 'bulging udders' were regarded by one vicar as such a distraction to the local youth that she was secretly buried in the churchyard.

A later vicar rediscovered her, and mistakenly thinking he had found an effigy of the Virgin Mary, restored her to the church with great pomp and ceremony! No doubt Jane will enjoy her new prominence, but should we worry about her effect on today's local youth?

Is it or isn't it?

Yes this really is the Parish Link in its new, computerised guise. The Parish Link has always been the main way the Church reaches out to everyone in our parishes, not just those who go to church. And like many familiar friends, maybe we have taken it a bit for granted. We thought it was time for a facelift and some new-fangled technology to bring it up to date. The eagle-eyed among you will notice there are no rotas in this month's Link. The reason we've cut them is to give more space to items of general interest. We know that for some of you, the rotas were the most useful thing about the magazine! - but don't panic, you will be getting your own personal copy instead. Those on the internet will be sent the rota electronically, those who are not, will get it via the post. A copy is also on display in church.

Easter - A gigantic hoax?

The first Easter - such an extraordinary time! Such an amazing event! Could anyone who was not there at the time really be expected to believe it?

Only four months ago, our text in church was, "He shall be called Immanuel, God with us." Wise men were coming from the east, in search of the new King. On Good Friday, we will remember Jesus, God and King, being humiliated and crucified. Only a couple of days later, Jesus will rise! And soon the King will come into His Kingdom.

It has been such a short time for us to take in His story. No wonder minds may boggle.

I once tried to read Stephen
Hawking's 'A Brief History of Time'.
Why? First, the title attracted me - I imagined that was exactly what it would be, brief! Simple enough for me to understand and quote at length to all those I suspected had wished they had read it but hadn't. Second, it attempted to explain the mind of God as He created the universe: proof of God the Creator, I thought! As far as I am concerned, Stephen Hawking failed - as anyone would fail who tried

to write a brief understanding of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. However, if you do want a readable account, try 'Easter Enigma' by John Wenham, Paternoster Press. The Easter Enigma is not primarily a comfort but a challenge: there are two alternatives: either it is the supreme fact in history or it is a gigantic hoax

Fact? Certainly a small group of friends were so convinced that they turned the whole world upside-down with the evidence of their changed lives. Hoax? Sure, there will be plenty of space adventure experts who will demonstrate that Jesus had no trouble getting Himself beamed up out of the tomb. Others will claim that research suggests that Jesus lay in a cataleptic state and revived, in true Spielberg style, in time to beat Mary and the disciples' arrival at the tomb. Others will claim hysteria, hallucinations, and subsequent cooking of the Gospel books. There's got to be a scientific explanation! It couldn't really have been true - could it?

So what evidence do we have?

Firstly - those disciples. What could have changed that band of sad

defeated cowards into fearless missionaries? They turned the Roman world around and terrified the Jewish leaders, and in their wake a great company of Christians now inhabit every part of the world.

Secondly - the institution of the Christian Sunday by new Christians previously so strongly committed to their own historic Sabbath traditions.

Thirdly - the witness recorded, down all the ages, by a multitude of men, women and children, from every nation on Earth, who have found a foundation for salvation and a model for life in the risen Jesus Christ. Their transformed lives testify to the reality of their experience of the resurrection. That promise made by God, proclaimed by prophets and preached by preachers, still stands fast: "He shall be called Immanuel, God with us."

God is with us. He will never, ever, leave us. We learn this again at Easter. We carry it with us through May, on through the year, and for the rest of our lives.



Sherrard honoured as High Sheriff

Wednesday 7th April 2004 will be a special day for the Sherrard family. In a ceremony, held at his home in Bunbury, Simon Sherrard will be installed as the High Sheriff of Cheshire.

As the new High Sheriff, Simon may well have some explaining to do during his year in office. After all, just what is the role of such a dignitary in the twenty first century? 'Sheriff' conjures up compelling images that are not helpful in describing the responsibilities of a modern day High Sheriff. The legendary Robin Hood fought against the notorious Sheriff of Nottingham's injustices while in westerns, spaghetti or otherwise, the sheriff is too often the beleaguered, lone law enforcer. Certainly these connotations bear little resemblance to the true duties of our new High Sheriff or indeed the manner in which they will be performed.

The responsibilities of the High Sheriff, the Queen's judicial representative, are exclusively linked to the judiciary, crime prevention and the maintenance of law and order. The High Sheriff has a real job of work to do, principally attending Her Majesty's Judges, acting as Electoral Returning Officer in some constituencies and assisting the statutory agencies. Simon hopes to encourage closer, more effective working relationships between the statutory agencies to make our communities safer.

The High Sheriff must also appoint a Chaplain to assist him during his tenure. Simon invited our very own Reverend Rick Gates to fulfill this role. Rick, delighted that the emphasis for the year will be youth, has commented "I will certainly do my best to support Simon and to encourage a practical Christian perspective as his Chaplain".

As a businessman, Mr Sherrard's leadership skills and expertise are much in demand. Many of his business and charitable interests are closely connected to the maritime world. Indeed, it was the lure of the high seas that brought Simon and Sara and their four children to landlocked Bunbury in 1986. Having been living in Singapore, Hong Kong and Malaysia for the previous eleven years, the move to Cheshire was prompted by his appointment as Chief Executive of Bibby Line Group, the Liverpool-based shipping

company that has now developed interests in logistics and business finance.

Master of the busy diary, Simon is currently Chairman of the Bibby Line Group Ltd, The Port of London Authority, Johnson Service Group plc, A&P Group Ltd and Deputy-Chairman of Lloyd's Register. He has several other non-executive director roles and is an Elder Brother of Trinity House, Deputy Chairman of the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine and a Member of the Council of the Mission to Seafarers.

Determined to make a real contribution during his Shrieval year, Simon will focus particularly on young people by supporting DebtCred and Crimebeat, two charities working with teenagers in Cheshire. DebtCred promotes education programmes for school leavers, teaching them how to manage personal finances in the face of unprecedented access to credit. Crimebeat, sponsored by High Sheriffs nationally, encourages young people to design and participate in crime prevention schemes.

When the work is done and it's time for relaxation, Simon enjoys golf, tennis and breeding rare sheep. He is an occasional cricketer and President of Bunbury Cricket Club. His love of the game was first kindled at school when he played in the Eton XI. Later, he went on to play for The Sussex Martlets and The Duke of Norfolk's XI at Arundel.

So it is no surprise that Simon has chosen a charity cricket match to raise much needed funds for DebtCred and Crimebeat and to highlight their achievements in Cheshire. The High Sheriff has challenged the famous Bunbury Celebrity Cricket Team to a match at Bunbury Cricket Club on Sunday 13 June 2004. It will be quite an event for the village with lots of fun for families, cricket fans and celebrity watchers. The Bunburys, created by David English, play just twenty matches every season and their members are professional sportsmen and other celebrities. The Bunburys rarely reveal in advance who will be playing. No one will know, not even the High Sheriff himself, until the big day.
