TIM HAYWARD Your Vicar

When I think of God, I hear a song, and it's a song that moves me. It

has a melody, it has a groove, and it has a certain rhythm. People have heard this song for thousands of years, across continents and cultures, across time. People have heard the song and they've found it captivating, and they've wanted to hear more. And there have always been people who say there is no song, but the song keeps playing.

And so Jesus came to show us how to live in tune with the song. He's the way, the truth and the life. This isn't a statement about one religion being better than all the other religions. The last thing Jesus came to do was to start a new religion. He came to show us reality at its most raw, he came to show us how things are. Jesus is God taking on flesh and blood, and so in his generosity, and in his compassion, that's what God is like. In his telling of the truth, that's what God is like. In his love, and forgiveness, and sacrifice, that's what God is like. That's who God is, and that's how the song goes.

The song is playing all around us all the time. The song is playing everywhere, it's written on our hearts, and everybody is playing the song. The question isn't whether or not you're playing a song, the question is are you in tune?

God is generous: so when I'm selfish, or stingy and I refuse to give, I'm essentially out of tune with the song. God is love: unrestrained, unconditional love. So when you see someone sacrifice themselves for another, for the well being of somebody else, it's like they're playing in the right key.



Have you got the X factor?

They're inspiring and powerful, and they're in tune with the song.

Now some people know all sorts of stuff about music. They know about pitch, about modes, and keys and instruments. They can hear things maybe other people can't, they can hear subtlety and nuance in the song that other people might miss. But it's also possible to be so caught up in the technical aspects of the song, that you miss its simple pure enjoyment.

Now there are people who talk like they know everything about being a Christian, and yet they can seem way out of tune. And then there are others who might say, they don't know much at all about the Christian faith, and yet they can seem very in tune with the song. I've met lots of people who struggle to know what it means to have a relationship with God, and yet they show faith, hope, love, truth, compassion and justice, and generosity.

Maybe you have this sense like you have no relationship with God because these ideas you have, and these things that you've been told about what it is and what it isn't, don't resonate. But perhaps the way that Jesus lived: you can see that, you can understand that, you can relate to that, you can play that song. And as you live in tune with the song, in tune with the creator of the universe, may you realise that you are in relationship with the living God, the song is written on your heart.

You do have the X Factor.

As RAF Marham was used by the Royal Family to fly to and from Sandringham, he was fortunate to meet several of them as they passed through and on one occasion, to sit next to the Queen for a formal lunch (and see inside her handbag!). He was honoured to meet her again in Buckingham Palace when she pinned the OBE on his chest. He

left the RAF as a Group Captain to train full-time for the priesthood. He was ordained in 2001 and 'served his title' in Bromsgrove. At the end of his curacy, he became the Rector of a group of very rural parishes on the borders of Worcestershire. Gloucestershire and Herefordshire. He retired from there to Bunbury in September 2013. He enjoys spending time with his family, walking, working as

a volunteer lock-keeper at Bunbury Locks, gardening, reading, 'fiddling' with his 1971 Triumph Herald and taking the occasional service.

Memorial service to our loved ones

A special memorial service is to be held at St Boniface on Sunday 2 November at 4pm. Bunbury School news

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law.



Mrs Crotty writes: The school has been studying the Fruit of the Spirit. All class teachers have taken part and the children have moved around the school to visit the different fruits. It starts at the beginning of the week with Mrs Thacker, and then ends with Revd Tim or Revd Veronica. We split into seven age groups and they rotate around the teachers, hence the term "roundabout assembly". As a school we felt that it was a really important subject to get across to the children. Even if one is not Christian the fruits are the basis for a really good person. My assembly has been kindness and goodness; some of the children say some really

profound things. This morning one of the Y2 children said "Kindness is love." At the end of the seven weeks the children will be visiting St Boniface where there will be interactive displays linked to each fruit. On Sunday 16 November there will be a celebration service in church.

Rev. Veronica and I are hoping to start an ethos group in school. Details to follow later.

Year 5 are preparing for their visit to Chester Cathedral for Pilgrim Day. Pilgrim Day takes place at Chester Cathedral and one year over 800 children attended. During the day the children learn about pilgrimage, Benedictine prayer and how prayer is as important today as when the Cathedral was built. According to legend, a prehistoric Druid temple existed on this site, which was succeeded by a Roman temple dedicated to Apollo; when Christianity became the state religion of Rome in the fourth century AD, the pagan temple may have become a Christian church. Certainly a church was founded here in 660, and in 875 the relics of St. Werburgh were brought to Chester to protect them from attacks by the Vikings. Year 5 will learn more about St. Werburgh. They also have the opportunity to hear the organ being played, try new crafts, and enjoy new musical experiences, the joy of collect worship with other school children for across the county and it is hoped that they day will help them to understand what it is to be a pilgrim.

The open day is on Tuesday 2 December for reception 2015 parents 1.15pm-2.30pm. Other parents are welcome to look round too.

Made in God's image

Wow, these third Sundays come round so quickly and it was lovely to welcome George Williams and his family and friends to October's, writes curate Veronica Green.

The beginning of the service included a generous greeting to everyone but especially young George, who was being baptized and welcomed into the church family. Smiles were drawn from the whole congregation as his image appeared on the screen - snapshots of George and brother

The theme for the service was we are made in God's image - his likeness. The band played and led our songs of worship and Stephen Broadbent guided us through thought-provoking prayers. While Revd Tim explored the good news of our being made in the image of God and bearing His characteristics of creativity, communication, responsibility, intelligence, spirituality and relationship, in the children's corner we discussed our likeness to our own family. We looked at photos of relatives and compared our physical likeness while also thinking about God's character of kindness and love and how being made in His image should affect all we do and say. The children cut and pasted pictures of people, old, young, black, white - all made in God's image - and created a wonderful cross-shaped collage depicting the uniqueness of us all, reminding us of our unique Creator God and Father.

Each one of us is "Fearfully and wonderfully made" (Psalm 139:14); The children drew around one of their feet and created a pictorial memory for George and his family of all those who shared his special day and stood alongside him.

We too are a wonderful collage, created and shaped by God, we should celebrate our differences, embrace the gifts we meet in others and reflect all of God's purposeful characteristics - each of us a snapshot bright eyed and full of life.

Freda, Bunbury's own Jambuster



As Burrows' Butchers appeared to contract into the tiny original shop and the greengrocers seemed to reopen next door when ITV got to work on Home Fires, we stepped back with them to 1939. The filming triggered curiosity over the 'real' experiences of the Burrows family at the time.

It was Freda Burrows' dream to be a nurse. As war loomed it seemed her dream would be fulfilled. As her six brothers and the one non-family

assistant went to war, Fred Burrows turned to daughter Freda to become a butcher instead. She became the first female butcher in the area, slaughtering, cutting up carcasses and serving in the shop and dealing with coupons and rationing - not quite what she had had in mind. She said, "It had to be done, otherwise the business would have gone under".

What happened to her brothers? Freda's husband, Ken Cheers, has a newspaper cutting from September 1943 (right). Frank (27) went into the Tank Corps, Fred W.(26), an RAF wireless operator, was on operational duty over Germany during the Battle of Britain, then

went out to the Middle East. He was reported missing on September 6 1941 and was later found to be a prisoner of war in Germany. Thomas and George (23) were twins. Thomas was a corporal in the RAF and, like his brother Fred, joined up in 1938, before the war started. He went out to Egypt in 1939 and served through the campaigns in Greece and Crete, returning to Egypt. George became a Leading Cook in the



Royal Navy, seeing service in the Mediterranean and the Fiji Islands. APO Roy Burrows (21) joined the RAF and won the Elliot Memorial Prize at Halton and spent two years at Nottingham University studying engineering, before being commissioned. John (18) joined the RAF as a wireless operator and air-gunner the month before the article was written, having previously been

in the Air Training Corps. They also had a younger sister and brother, Joyce and Eric. Continued on page 11

Harvest at St Boniface



The delights and challenges of training as a Pastoral Worker



I have just started training to be a Pastoral Worker (PW), writes Amber Middlemiss. This is a licensed role in the Church of England, similar to a Lay Reader but with the emphasis more on pastoral work in all its forms eg visiting the sick and bereaved, running groups and many other roles. It can also include some involvement in the running/leading of services but this tends to be more secondary.

Last year I completed the Diocese's 'Foundations for Ministry' course which was a general grounding in basic theology with many practical applications such as studying what the Bible says the

Kingdom of God is like and then considering how closely my church resembles that. Out of this assignment came the idea for setting up the 'Friday morning at Tilly's' group for older people which I'm really enjoying; it's just great to see people come along and get to know others and enjoy coffee, cake and chat. It's gratifying that I need to do so little - just facilitate the odd introduction, a bit of chat, and then everyone else gets on with it and people step in and help, and do lifts, and generally make it very easy - it feels like a privilege to be part of such a buzz, and of course Kevin and the team at Tilly's are a huge support in all of it. There is always room for more - we haven't guite filled Tilly's yet - so if you haven't been do come and say hello any Friday morning - and if you don't consider yourself to be the right age then just come as a friend and get to know a few more people in the village.

Although I'm only two weeks into the PW course proper I'm feeling quite challenged by the teaching on the first module, Volunteers and Teamwork, and excited to see what will come out of it all.... I hope to keep you up-to-date with a short piece like this each month in the Link.

Dorothy was born in November 1925 to parents Stephen and Mary at Church Bank Cottage Bunbury. She had an older brother Frank. She attended the girls' school in College Lane Bunbury. After leaving school she worked at the village grocery and newsagents shop, one of her jobs was to deliver the papers on her bike around

Haughton and Spurstow.

Her great sadness in her life was losing her beloved Ed in 1974 just months after they had completed work on the bungalow that took them 5 years, a real labour of love. She stayed there and was never short of company. Dorothy was very talented at all kinds of embroidery and needle work, as well as baking - in her younger years she was always baking cakes for people. Dorothy always had company, because she was such a good friend to many, and adopted several families as her own. She was so devoted to the Large family - growing up with Mari, Nancy and Molly and playing on the farm. She was wonderful with children - she was a real support to Gary and Suzi McCormick, and Emily's first words were 'Dot, Dot, Dot!' She eventually gave up work to care for her father after he had, had a stroke. After her father passed away she got a new job

working at Bunbury Aldersey School as an Assistant to the Cook and she stayed there until she retired.

Dorothy was always involved with St Boniface church and was such a staunch supporter of the church. She was so proud of being a part of its history. No doubt being born and growing up in its shadow had a profound influence on her life. She took a pride in cleaning the silver for many years; she was very involved in making and teaching people to make the Kneelers and worked tirelessly for Beeston Castle Fete. When Miss Churton had the fancy goods stall, she worked all year knitting and sewing for it. She managed the tea tent and raffle at Beeston Castle Fete for many years with Mary Large, a good friend.

She also supported events at St Jude's and Calveley Dorothy was a member of the Bunbury W I for many years and rarely missed a meeting. Her last outing with the W I was a trip to Wales in June. Dorothy was a true Bunbarian, living all her life in the village and loved this village and its people. She would often speak of the many stories and secrets she carried with her, and of her many diaries and jour-nals. She was a lovely writer and her diaries could probably be bestsellers.... but she would never want her journals to be published. Not only have we lost a wonderful woman in Dorothy, we have lost a little history of the village. Dorothy was thoughtful of others, right to the very end getting all her affairs in order, and she had no fear of death - she was remarkably strong and her faith made her so.

Pauline Chesters - fought adversity and won



Pauline was born and brought up in Tiverton and was the eldest daughter of Norman and the late Alma Chesters. She attended Tarporley Primary School and, although she had a disability, she coped with everyday life and never complained.

Her main interests were attending the chapels at Tiverton and Bunbury, where she made numerous friends, as well as enjoying Bingo and writing to her many pen friends in the UK and abroad. Later, when she became more dependent on her carers, she was always interested in what they had to say. Pauline will always be remembered as a loving daughter, sister, aunty and wonderful friend to all who knew her.

Roy Harding - The Boss



Roy was born in Spurstow at Brooklands in 1938 and went to Spurstow school and then on to Bunbury. He was fiercely competitive and he loved football. Roy was a good player, and teams wanted him on their side. He was known for standing up for his teammates, and for his tackling as the hard-man of the side.

He played football for Bunbury and Varden, playing centre forward or centre half. He went for trials with Wolves, and modelled his game on Billy Wright who won 105 caps for

Roy broke his leg at Barrow, but drove home, put his wellies on and went out to do the milking. He worked hard and he played

Roy worked at Cappers Lane farm, for Norman Williams, who was Roy's best man. And it was at Norman's, Roy met Gwen who was helping out and collecting eggs. They were married in September 1962 at Faddiley Chapel, and were together for 52 years. They went to Blackpool for their honeymoon, going up the Tower, and saying never again, and coming home early, because it didn't suit. Roy and Gwen were content just where they were - they didn't need to travel or go on holiday. They made a home with son David, daughter Jenny and grandson Brock and these were the things that made them most content. Roy was a good friend to many with a story to tell at the Nags or the Dysart or the Crewe Arms. In the 70s Roy got his own dairy herd; he liked to buy and then sell them on, and had a few sheep too. He had his own cattle wagon and loved going to the auctions at Oswestry, Beeston or Crewe where he was known as the Boss.

Roy retired in 2000 and this gave him more time to breed and race pigeons, winning several trophies - one race was over 700 miles to France. He had a proud collection of trophies, not just from the pigeons, but also from football, and the greyhound days with uncles Herbert and Harold, going to Bellevue, Scotland, London.

Sadly Roy was diagnosed with Parkinson's in 2007 and this can't have been easy for him or indeed Gwen as the dementia started to take its toll. Roy's family are very grateful to all the staff at Church House Nursing home who cared for Roy so well.

The two eldest boys' wives, Vera (with baby Anthony) and Lynne (now a local Land Girl) were anxiously waiting at home in Bunbury. Apart from being a butcher, Freda was constantly writing loving, morale boosting letters to her brothers, knitting (she could alter patterns as she knitted) and was deeply involved in the WI and British Legion, of which her father was President.

Amazingly, all the Burrows boys returned safely. Many people will remember Frank (Mark's grandfather) as Bunbury's butcher and John as the grocer/greengrocer, who eventually moved his shop into new premises he built next door, now the Co-op.

Freda was born in 1923 at Dairy Cottage, Haughton, the year before the farm was sold and the family founded their butchers' in Bunbury. Growing up in a big family in the 20s and 30s, everyone had jobs to do. Freda became almost a second mother, helping prepare and

serve large amounts of food to a growing family. In 1951 she married Ken and they later bought Brook Cottage, where Ken still lives and where they brought up Laura and Andrew. Freda was Akela of Bunbury Cubs for 26 years, assisted by Joyce and, later, John's wife, Eva. Freda was ever busy and involved in every village activity. She died in 2007.

Prisoner of war, Flight-Sergeant Fred W. Burrows was eventually able to write home, via the Red Cross:

Stalag Luft III May 8th 1943

My Dear Parents,

I do not need to search the recesses of my memory to conjure a mental picture of home. Each time I close my eyes, a vision of the serene order of events in the village, with home and you at the centre, makes me yearn to return. It would be wonderful to take a walk on a summer evening through the fields towards the hills. I can imagine standing on Beeston Crag and looking over the vista of cultured land verdant with green of the pastures and golden where the setting sun caresses a field of corn. There is a murmur of wind in the trees; the birds call to each other as they fly lazily homewards and the last rays of a sinking orange ball cloak the valley in mystic purple shadows. Twilight falls, and with it a breeze nips through the meadow grass, whispering a song of perfect peace in a country where men may freely think and freely live. The dream fades, and I look around - the wire enclosure, no green grass, no beauty of nature and my heart cries, "How long, O, Lord, how long?"

Forgive me if I have bored you with idle dreams, but there is so little to tell you, with the exception that I am healthy in body and mind, that I am pleased that everyone is well and business worries nil. I am longing to see you all again, but until that day comes I must be content, and ask you to keep smiling too.




