Nearly everyone tries at some time or other a new

diet or self-help book that promise quick results from easy to follow formulae. But most of us who are disappointed with the results never write for refunds - a mixture of guilt and embarrassment sees to that.

Who can forget the cabbage soup diet? Living on nothing else for a week may have shifted the weight, but may have also made your friends unlikely to come anywhere near you!

If anything, Lent teaches us the kingdom of God is a slow process of building, and unlike our quick-fix, instant self-help guides, this kingdom cannot be built even in 40 days.

Lent teaches us short cuts don't usually work - they cheat the journey of faith. Getting to know ourselves and God is a long and winding road. God's work is slow - the Christian life is a marathon, not a sprint.

Lent can't be done in ten days or twenty minutes; it is 40 days.



Cabbage Soup!

There is no substitute for hard work. That's why miracle diets don't really work, so don't try a thirty day wonder; slowly change the way you eat; effort and will are better than quick fix cures.

Lent is all about slowing down and leaving quick-fix solutions behind. Jesus, in his Lent, turns his back on instant glory, instant results and an easy, happy ending. He will be glorified; he will get results; there will be a resurrection. But it will be in God's time, not ours. In surrendering himself to God, Jesus turns his back on cutting corners, short cuts, and the end justifying the means.

This Lent be sure you don't run and don't take short cuts - you'll miss something. You'll miss the slow, patient God, who is often found in the slog of ordinary life, not in the impostors of instant results and quick victories. A surrendered life is Jesus' path it's all he asks of us.

Jent course

The existence of suffering in the world is a major obstacle to belief in God for a great many people.

Thousands of books have been written on the subject of human suffering and there are many arguments that are put forward in an effort to explain

its existence, the classic ones being suffering is punishment, suffering is education and suffering is a privilege.

Some would seek to turn to the bible for an explanation and there is perhaps no greater treatise on suffering than the Book of Job. At 6pm each Sunday evening of Lent Revd Mike Rogers will lead a series of reflections in St Boniface church which, with the help of Job and all his troubles, might provide you with food for thought on which to ponder about your own assumptions about God and his place in human suffering.

As before, each session will last between 30 and 45 minutes and, with the exception of those Sundays when Evensong is sung when the reflection will replace the homily, will include a period of silence for contemplative prayer and the saying of Compline. You will be most welcome at any or all of the sessions.

Mike Rogers writes... **Recycling**

This year, I spent Christmas in America with our daughter who lives in Houston, Texas. Whenever I go there, I'm always fascinated by the catchy messages displayed outside some of the churches.

The trouble is, by the time I get home I've forgotten what most of them were and I seldom have the presence of mind to write them all down! However, I was sufficiently intrigued by one I saw this time to remember it; there, outside a Baptist chapel that the Americans would describe as 'cute', was a board which asked 'If you are going to waste, let God recycle you'. It wasn't the message's impact as a Christmas by-line that struck me, but more its applicability to the rapidly approaching season of Lent, that time when folk set about giving something up for 40 days. Now I have no difficulty with those who want to do this; the


pangs of longing that accompany the self-denial of something we hold dear serve as a powerful reminder of the privations Jesus endured in the wilderness before he began his ministry on earth, but perhaps the question asked by the board I spotted in America points us to something deeper.

Yes, Lent is a time when we recall Jesus' time in the wilderness, but it is also a time of preparation, or, if you prefer, recycling, such that we are ready to greet the amazing events of Easter and understand their impact on the world and more importantly, on our own lives.

The process of recycling could be described as turning something of little or no value into something of worth. So, this Lent, which perversely begins on St Valentine's Day, will you do as that board in America asks and '...let God recycle you?'

The theme of this year's service is: "All God's creation is very good". The painting above was done by Alice Pomstra-Elmont. Alice says about her painting: "The hands symbolically receive the divine gift and pass it on to the next generations. Every day the sun shines over the land where animals and plants have found a place. The fruits

and the vegetables tell us there is enough food for everyone. The red and yellow heliconia is native to Suriname and the majestic Kapok tree is a beautiful giant in the forests. The Voltzberg is one of Suriname's many granite mountains. The seven women symbolize all women in Suriname who cherish this gift to pass it on to their children. Seven also symbolizes the seven days of God's creation".

Suriname is a former Dutch colony but had been in British hands before that. On July 31, 1667, the English and Dutch signed the Treaty of Breda, in which for the time being the status quo was respected: the Dutch could keep occupying Suriname and the British the formerly Dutch colony New Amsterdam (modern-day New York). It is a fascinating country and we will be able to gain an insight into how life is for these women as well as thinking more about the theme. Please join us for (all or some) of the following:

About Suriname

Suriname is not very often in the news. However there was some news about former military leader Desi Bouterse who was elected to his second term as president in July 2015 after his National Democratic Party (NDP) won a slim majority in parliament.

He was elected to his first five-year term in 2010 after the Mega Combination alliance, which included the NDP, won the legislative election in May that year. He had ruled the former Dutch colony twice before as a result of military coups, from 1980 to 1987 and again in 1990.

In 1999, a Dutch court tried him in absentia and sentenced him to 11 years in prison for smuggling 400kg of cocaine.

In April 2012, Suriname's parliament passed a controversial amnesty law granting him immunity for alleged violations committed under his earlier military rule and for which he was due to face trial.

Recipe for coconut macaroons

Ingredients

(NB using half of the ingredients shown below will make a plateful of macaroons as shown above)

- " 5 ¼ cups (400g) or two packets of desiccated coconut
- " 397g condensed milk
- " 1 cup (120 g) plain flour
- " 2 tsp vanilla extract
- " Melted chocolate (optional for dipping)

Method

- 1. Heat oven to 170C degrees (gas mark 3).
- 2. Line a baking tray with lightly greased parchment paper.
- 3. Mix flour and coconut together in a bowl.
- 4. Add condensed milk and vanilla extract, stir well together until well blended.

5. Scoop by teaspoonfuls and, using wet hands, shape the macaroons into round balls before dropping them onto the baking tray.

6. Bake for 12-15 mins until top is golden brown.

7. Immediately remove from baking tray. Cool down completely before dipping in melted chocolate (optional).

Workshops feature throughout: in-house dance theatre company Fallen Angels will do dance workshop for all the family on Monday 19 February. Creators of Wallace and Gromit Aardman Studios will lead a session on clay modelling. A capella singer James Sills will do a workshop on performing songs from musicals, followed by a performance in the Garret.

New for 2018: WayWord Flicks, a selection of family favourite short films - price includes a ticket, headsets for audio and a snack.

There will be a **hip-hop** dance workshop, code a drone, Lego stop motion and computer game design. 'Play in a day' on Saturday 24 February, gets participants to work with theatre makers to write, rehearse and perform a play in a day. The Atrium will welcome families to a Silent Disco and Artful Playground will perform with their swing band. Festival favourite Den Building returns for its 5th year: families will create incredible hiding spaces together.





Storytelling is at the heart of the programme with sessions daily in Storyhouse's children's library, plus Caveman parties, a puzzle library and free themed arts and crafts including kite, dreamcatcher and puppet making. Storyhouse's independent cinema will screen Aardman's latest film Early Man, plus documentary Jane and classic reissue Doctor Dolittle.

Bunbury Buses saved but with Loss of Chester service

When Cheshire East began its Subsidised Bus Service Review, last year, which included the 56 and 83 routes from Bunbury, both services were recommended for withdrawal. The Parish Council and residents responded to the review with many written and online replies, a deputation of Parish Councillors and residents attending an open meeting in Nantwich, and Chairman Ron Pulford and Vice Chairman Nick Parker going to see Cheshire East Leader, Rachel Bailey, to explain why it was essential to retain bus services from Bunbury. The number of responses from Bunbury, regarding our two routes, was higher than from any other area. In November many changes to the subsidised services were agreed by Cheshire East, but the Bunbury services were retained, with one alteration. Unfortunately our once a week service to Chester will be withdrawn but instead of the original two services to Nantwich there will now be three, on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Thank you to all those residents who joined our campaign and helped to save the Bunbury buses. Details of the new services, including timetables, will be confirmed following the procurement and appointment of a bus operator for each route. Further details are expected to be announced early in 2018. You can see the review report on the Cheshire East website by searching on 'Supported Bus Service Review'.

The PC met on 13 December with six Councillors in attendance. Ward Cllr Michael Jones has submitted his resignation which will become effective early in the New Year. We thank him for his valued advice and guidance. Stand by for an election! Four parishioners attended.

Dave Evans, Bowling Club Chairman, reported on the need for new mowing equipment. It was agreed that the PC would consider this at the January meeting. The club has more than 60 members, 40 from Bunbury. Sir Francis Drake loved bowling and so does Bunbury!

Your PC wish all Bunbarians a Happy New Year of health and smiles. The PC met on 10 January and five Councillors attended, with several apologies received. Three parishioners attended. Do come along and see what the PC does on your behalf. One planning application was discussed. More than 200 parishioners and Father Christmas attended the Carols around the Christmas Tree event on Christmas Eve, with prayers from the Vicar, dressed as an angel. Crewe Brass provided marvellous musical accompaniment. A collection was made for Tarporley Hospital. The Council agreed to purchase a new mower and scarifier for the Bowling Club, with help from money raised by the club and a grant from Tesco. The club is 60 years old and we are really glad to be able to lend our support to them. A discussion took place about the campaign to reopen the station at Beeston. The Council fully support this project. Long-time Bunbury resident Mrs Hickie will be 100 years old later this month. Many congratulations from the Parish Council - well done! Congratulations also to Ted Fowles from Bunbury British Legion who has been honoured with the BEM for voluntary service to ex-Service personnel over many years. Give us Two Minutes - Anne King



I grew up in Hartford, Northwich. I attended the local Primary and Northwich County Grammar School for Girls, which is now Leftwich High, writes this issue's Two Minutes contributor, Anne King. In the late 70s I attended Mid Cheshire College, where I trained to be a Nursery Nurse (NNEB). My first 'proper job' was as a daily nanny to a three month old baby boy, what a responsibility!

After two years I applied for a job as a live in Nanny to three boys aged 5, 3 and 18 months in Cholmondeley. I have recently met up with them after 30 years and told them what mischief they used to get up to! They certainly kept me on my toes!

I moved on, after a year, to work for Social Services in a day nursery for under privileged children under 5. It was a very interesting, but tough place to work.

Four years later, I applied for the position of Bunbury School's very first Classroom Assistant. I was originally employed to work in Reception with Mrs Olwen Williams. However, the rest of the staff were jealous and wanted extra help as well, so I was released in the afternoons to help in other classes.

I was married in 1988 and Charlotte was born in 1990. She now lives and works in Manchester, after attending Bunbury, Tarporley High, Sir John Deane's and University of Liverpool. Charlotte is ambitious and has worked extremely hard to get where she is now and has never been out of a job, which makes me extremely proud. She is very much a career girl at the moment, but I'm sure grandchildren won't be too far away. I can't believe I've been at school for 31 years, it has flown by. I have worked for six Head Teachers and seen many staff and children come and go. 




