Don't forget Mothering Sunday - 18 March

There is an old Jewish saying:

God could not be everywhere, so He made mothers.

Mother Church, Mother Earth, Mother of the Gods - our human mothers - all have been part of the celebration of 'Mothering Sunday', as the fourth Sunday in Lent is affectionately known. It has been celebrated in the UK since the 16th century.

In Roman times, great festivals were held every spring to honour Cybele, Mother of all the Gods. Other pagan festivals in honour of Mother Earth were also celebrated. With the arrival of Christianity, the festival became one honouring Mother Church.

During the Middle Ages, young people apprenticed to craftsmen or working as 'live-in' servants were allowed only one holiday a year on which to visit their families - this is how 'Mothering Sunday' got its name. This special day became a day of family rejoicing, and the Lenten fast was broken. In some places the day was called Simnel Day, because of the sweet cakes called simnel cakes traditionally eaten on that day.

Laura and Luke make it to Papua New Guinea

After four months of training and preparation, Laura and Luke have reached their destination in Papua New Guinea (PNG) and are in the midst of acclimatisation and orientation. Their day starts at 6am as the sun (and wildlife) rises. Classes begin at 8am with songs and a Bible passage in Tok Pisin (the main trade language) before language lessons. The photo here shows the bamboo walled classroom, with bug-screen-windows, ceiling fans, aged wicker furniture, musty bookshelves, and maps and artifacts on the walls.

Later in the morning, they hear testimonies and lectures on topics such as anthropology, basic medicine, radio skills, fire lighting, purifying water and stress management.

Everything is geared towards building relationships with the PNG people. As they write on their blog: "It's a steep learning curve for us so we really do value your prayers. I'm back! I thought I'd vented my gargoylian spleen enough last year, but no, I'm as grumpy as ever. And that's because of one thing that it doesn't seem that the New Year has brought: consideration.

Love him or loathe him, Confucius had a point: "Consideration for others is the basis of a good life, a good society." Personally I think Winnie the Pooh said it better: "A little Consideration, a little Thought for Others, makes all the difference."

How often do you think of others as you meander through your daily life, getting your work done, achieving your aims, ticking off your things to do list? When you drive your kids to the school bus and leave your engine running as you wait for the bus to arrive, whom are you considering then? Passers-by walking their dogs? Children standing outside waiting for the bus whose parents can't spare the time to wait with them? The owners of the houses who have to tolerate the noise of the engines?

Or are you really just considering yourself: your need to stay warm, your toasty warm bum nestled on your heated seat, your children hushed by the in-car sound system. But it makes us all feel better, takes us out of ourselves – and makes your village a happier place. Often I hear people who have experienced hardship or illness say, 'I never knew what it was like until I went through it myself'. Eh? We don't have to wait until we are the ones breathing in the fumes or living at a school bus pick-up point, do we? So although it may cause us a little discomfort, let's change how we behave so we make others' lives a little more comfortable.

Even if it means getting a cold bottom – trust me, you get used to it.

Cookery Page

Don't tell the old girl, but it's Mothering Sunday in March and I have decided to give Fatima a bit of a treat. Normally it is a quick flip to a restaurant, but this year I am going to knock the socks off her by cooking this special recipe one of my golfing chums gave me - he assures me that 'nothing can go wrong' and that she is bound to be impressed. All I need from Greg is an idea for the wine - could be tricky with all those lemon flavours in the food.

Ingredients

200g couscous

400ml boiling chicken stock

2 tbsp olive oil

4 courgettes, grated

2 lemons, 1 halved, 1 cut into wedges

2 boneless, skinless chicken breasts Ground black pepper

How to prepare it

1 Tip the couscous into a large bowl and pour over the boiling stock. Cover and leave for 10 mins until fluffy and all the stock has been absorbed.

2 Heat 1 tbsp oil and fry the courgettes

until softened and crisping at the edges. 3 Tip into the couscous, then stir in with plenty of seasoning and a good squeeze of lemon juice from one of the halves. 4 Halve the chicken breasts horizontally and put each piece on a sheet of cling film. Cover with another sheet and beat each piece out with a rolling pin to make it thinner. Season.

5 Heat the remaining oil in a large pan and fry the chicken for about 2 mins on each side until cooked through.

6 Squeeze over the juice from the other lemon half, sprinkle with freshly ground black pepper and serve with the couscous and lemon wedges on the side.

And the wine to go with it...

When trying to match wines with food there are a two choices, either of which can keep us on the right track: 1) go 'plump' for a complete opposite on the taste spectrum (a great example being savoury cheese matching beautifully with sweet desert wines or Port); or 2) play it safe and go 'like-for-like'. In this case, choosing the latter approach, I would look for a wine with lemon flavours to counterbalance the flavours of Major Cruttock's Mothering Sunday feast; the good news is that white wines expressing lemon citrus characteristics are more often than not likely to be young, inexpensive and easy to obtain! Read the tasting notes on the label or ask for help, as there are many varieties that fit the bill. Reds will not pair up well with lemon flavours, but there are a number of real ales that have pronounced lemon flavours, such as: Deucher's IPA; Harvistoun's Bitter and Twisted; and Oakham's Jeffery Hudson bitter. **Cheers! Greg**

Thought of the month

Before filling in an application form for a job, applicants naturally seek out - in some form or another - the job description. What will I be required to do? The applicant then asks himself or herself some fundamental questions: could I cope? Would I find the job satisfying?

So what is the job description for being a Christian? Someone once joked, 'The working conditions are lousy but the retirement benefits are out of this world'. What did Jesus have to say about being a Christian? He told his twelve key followers that he was sending them out 'like sheep among wolves' - hardly encouraging! - and said, 'They will hand you over to councils and flog you in their synagogues; and you will be dragged before governors and kings because of me'. Jesus left them in no doubt that the job description of a

Christian involved some suffering.

In many parts of the world today Christians suffer horribly, losing their homes, their families and even their lives through persecution.

We all, of course, sometimes suffer the burden of pain and grief which may seem too heavy to cope with on our own. We all have difficulties that may test our endurance to the limit. But Jesus showed us that God knows what it is to suffer, and the Bible promises that, however great our burden at any point, God will always give us sufficient strength to carry on. The job description of the Christian may well include persecution, suffering and grief but it also includes the promise of God's grace to enable us to continue to serve him, whatever comes our way.

General Synod standardises church fees

At the February General Synod, the new fees for weddings and funerals to apply from 1 January 2013 were finally agreed (see 'Shake-up of wedding fees rejected', Parish Link August 2011). Although coverage in the national press has suggested that the new fees are much larger than the current ones, as is often the case, this does not reflect reality. What they have done is stop churches supplementing wedding or funeral fees with "extras" that were not genuinely extra - charges for administration, use of the church for rehearsals, consultation with the vicar, cleaning, contributions to building maintenance and so on. The basic fee is higher but churches are prohibited from supplementing this with additional charges for anything that is not a genuine extra. Genuine extras are fairly obvious: choosing to have an organist, bell ringers, a choir, a verger,

or flowers. Less obviously, heating has also been determined to be an "extra", although in mid-winter most people would not think that was something they could do without!

The net result of all this? For St Boniface, the fee for a wedding or funeral will remain virtually unchanged (a difference of maybe £10 depending on exactly how much is charged for heating). So have many hours of debate at General Synod and much additional background work and consultation all been a waste of time? Not necessarily. We now have uniform charges across the country and fees at a level that directly reflects the cost of the use and maintenance of buildings and the time required by clergy and others to provide their services. Some churches that were perhaps a little "creative" in the past with their charges for extras will have to reduce

fees, but that is not the case for any of our three churches.

What is Lent?



Many of us speak of 'giving something up for Lent', but what is Lent really about? For Christians, Lent is a time to prepare for the most important part of our year, for Easter when Jesus died on the cross of our sins and rose again from the dead. It starts on Ash Wednesday (which this year is 22 February) and ends at sunset on Maundy Thursday, the day before Good Friday. The day before Ash Wednesday is known as Shrove Tuesday (or Pancake Day!) and was traditionally the last chance to use up the foods that would not be eaten during Lent.

The custom of Lent appears to have originated in the prescribed fast of candidates for baptism (which always took place once a year on Easter Day). Lent lasts 40 days, not including Sundays. Why 40? This number has a special significance in the Bible: Moses, Elijah and Jesus all underwent 40-day fasts - Jesus went into the wilderness for 40 days to prepare himself for his ministry. But why not Sundays? Well, for Christians all Sundays are a mini-Easter and celebrate Jesus' rising from the dead.

During the early centuries of the Christian church, the fast was very strict: only one meal a day was allowed, taken towards evening, and meat and fish (and in some places milk and eggs) were forbidden. However, from the 9th century onwards, the practice became more and more relaxed, with the hour for breaking the fast moving back to three o'clock, and by the 15th century it was 12 noon!

These days, most of us give up something for Lent to help us remember what Jesus went through for us – to remind us what it feels like to do without. Many Christians also make a point of putting aside the money that they have saved by giving something up and giving it to a charity or a deserving cause.

It is perhaps easy to think of Lent in negative terms, but it is really an opportunity to strengthen your faith, and to grow in your love of God. Perhaps this year, as well as giving up something, you could also think about doing something positive: maybe start reading from the Bible every day; or commit yourself to writing a letter to someone each week of Lent; or make a special telephone call of encouragement each week in Lent; or do a specific extra act of kindness every day during Lent

Whilst the period of Lent is intended to put us in the right frame of mind to celebrate the Easter season to the full, there is also the possibility that our own preparations could also make a difference to other people.

Enjoy your Lent!

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
