## "Remember the sabbath day and keep it holy"

I wonder how good you are at observing this? It's probably the least well known and observed of the Ten Commandments. We live in a 24/7 age and perhaps find it hard to carve time out for ourselves. And yet the physical, mental, emotional and spiritual benefits of rest have been well documented.

The first use of the word 'holy' in the Bible is not to describe a person or a place, but the Sabbath itself: "Then God blessed the seventh day and made it holy"

Celebrating the Sabbath is an act of faith. God specifically told the children of Israel to stop even during ploughing and harvest. For an agrarian society, this was a radical and seemingly illogical idea. It was one way the Israelites stood out as God's people. There was nothing like it in the ancient world.

Sabbath reminds us to walk in rhythm with God, its regularity encourages us to find God in the ordinary patterns of life. Like the Israelites, each week, as we stop work and let go of the identities that define us there, we can return to our truest identity as the children of a loving God.

Without Sabbath, we can lose perspective. Work becomes an idol, the Sabbath corrects this imbalance and answers the call to a simpler life.

God told the Israelites to observe the Sabbath rest because he also rested after creation. We are made in God's image and designed with the Sabbath in mind. A weekly block of time to rest and recalibrate our emotions and thoughts is part of God's antidote to stress and burnout. It is not a rule made for us to follow arbitrarily, but designed because God knows us – and our needs – intimately.

Over the next three months I will also be taking up the gift of a sabbatical (offered to those who have been ministering in parishes for ten years) - an opportunity to take some time out to refresh and recharge the batteries. I am very grateful to the PCC for their support and look forward to sharing the benefits with you at the end of summer. My plan is simple: to study, to retreat, to holiday and in the process reconnect with my truest identity - as a beloved child of God.

## Sky notes for June: Too much light?

June nights are very short. In fact, it doesn't get properly dark at all. Midsummer's Day is on June 21, with the longest period of daylight and the shortest night. The June solstice occurs at 10:13 British Summer Time. The North Pole of the earth will be tilted toward the Sun, which will have reached its northernmost position in the sky and will be directly over the Tropic of Cancer at 23.44 degrees north latitude. This is the first day of summer (summer solstice) in the Northern Hemisphere and the first day of winter (winter solstice) in the Southern Hemisphere.

Stay up all night and you'll enjoy a procession of planets rising in the east. Saturn is first up at about 00.30am. Jupiter rises about 1.30am, with Mars nearby. Venus surges above the northeast horizon at about 3am.

The light June nights means it's difficult to spot faint stars. But it's artificial light that pollutes our night skies that I want to draw attention to this month. When I came to Bunbury 18 years ago, the skies were very dark. This was one of the main reasons for moving here. But, like in so many places, increasing artificial lights from developments, from "security" lights and from people choosing to light their gardens at night is gradually robbing our children of their heritage: to look up and wonder at the night sky in all its glory. This has already been lost to urban dwellers - lets hope this won't happen in rural Bunbury.

The fact is that much outdoor lighting used at night is inefficient, overly bright, poorly targeted, improperly shielded, and, in many cases, completely unnecessary. This light, and the electricity used to create it, is being wasted by spilling it into the sky, rather than focusing it on to the actual objects and areas that

people want illuminated.



A growing body of evidence links the brightening night sky directly to measurable negative impacts including increasing energy consumption, disrupting the ecosystem and wildlife, and harming human health. And too much light in the wrong place can affect crime and safety. Overly bright security lights produce shadows for burglars to hide. Glare from streetlights can make driving at night difficult.

The good news is that light pollution, unlike many other forms of pollution, is reversible and each one of us can make a difference:

•Only use lighting when and where it's needed

Light pollution in Britain as increased by around 30% since the 1990s

- If safety is a concern, install motion detector lights and timers
- Properly shield all outdoor lights (and avoid the really dazzling lights that are increasingly available these days)
- Keep your blinds drawn to keep light inside.

# School news

During May the official statutory testing timetable returned to primary schools across the country. This had been absent from schools' calendars for the past two years due to Covid. From May onwards children in Year 1, Year 2, Year 4 and Year 6 in Bunbury and across the country take part in some form of statutory testing as listed below.

Year 1 - Phonics Screening test

Year 2 - End of Key Stage 1 tests in reading, writing and maths

Year 4 - Multiplication tests

Year 6 - End of Key Stage 2 tests in reading, writing and maths.

There are many different views on the place of testing within the primary curriculum, but at Bunbury Primary the testing process is kept in perspective for the children. All the staff at Bunbury ensure that the children are prepared adequately so that they can achieve their potential. This year the children have worked incredibly hard deepening their learning. As headteacher I am extremely proud of each and every one of them.



For some children the process may be quite challenging; emotionally some may be on a rollercoaster and others take it all in their stride. It is



not easy being tested as a child at any age, but there is something that the children of Bunbury school are asked to remember: none of the tests listed above measure what makes them special and unique. The tests do not measure singing, dancing or creativity. The tests do not measure how kind the children are to their friends or classmates. The tests do not know how far the children can run, ride a horse or how many goals they have scored. Tests do not show that children have overcome hurdles and obstacles and certainly do not show how special, unique and amazing they are as individuals.

The results from these tests will tell us something, but not everything.

At the end of the Year 6 week of testing we provided our children with the opportunity to celebrate, thus beginning the start of the transition process from primary to secondary. The children enjoyed a picnic and games afternoon with their classmates as well as the tradition annual water fight with Rev Tim, Miss Hickson and myself.

Katie Everton's fête pudding competition winning

## **Jubilee Pudding**

## Ingredients

For the white

### **Method**

#### STEP 1

For the white chocolate layer, heat the cream in a saucepan until steaming and bubbles appear around the edge. Add the chocolate and lemon zest and stir until melted. Set six short tumblers tilted on their sides in a muffin tin (this is how you get a slanted layer). Pour the mixture into the glasses, then chill for 4 hrs, or until set.

#### **STEP 2**

For the raspberry layer, put all the raspberries in a food processor and whizz until puréed. Push through a sieve using a wooden spoon directly into a jug, then stir through the lemon juice. Put the cream and sugar in a saucepan and warm gently until the sugar melts. Increase the heat and boil for 3 mins, stirring continuously. Remove from the heat

and stir through the purée. Cool for 15 mins before sitting the glasses upright and pouring over the white chocolate layer. Chill for 4 hrs or until set.

#### **STEP 3**

Decibellas

Heat the oven to 170C/150C fan/gas 3. Line a baking sheet with non-stick parchment. To

make the shortbread, put the butter and sugar in a bowl and beat with an electric whisk until pale and fluffy. Mix in 1/4 tsp fine sea salt, the flour and pistachios to get a stiff dough, then bring together with your hands into a smooth ball. Put between two sheets of baking parchment and roll out to around 1/2 cm. Chill for 20 mins. Cut into 20 rounds about 4cm and place on the baking sheet. Bake for 20-25 mins, then slide off the sheet onto a wire rack and leave to cool.

#### STEP 4

When ready to serve, top the possets with the blueberries, violas and mint and serve with the pistachio biscuits. The pistachio biscuits look lovely dipped into melted chocolate and sprinkled with crushed pistachios or rose petals.

#### Transforming grace

An ex-convict is turned away by innkeepers, leaving him to sleep on the street, angry and rejected, until Bishop Myriel of Digne takes him in. The bishop feeds him, giving him shelter, only to be repaid by the ex-convict stealing his silverware as he sleeps. When the local policemen drag the exconvict back to the bishop's residence, Myriel hands him two candlesticks as well saying that he forgot to take them earlier. The words and actions of the bishop save the ex-convict from spending the rest of his life in prison and set him up with enough money to become a "respectable businessman".

If you have ever read Victor Hugo's classic 1862 French novel, or watched the spectacular musical Les Misérables, you will recognise this as part of the redemption struggles of his protagonist, Jean Valjean.

This example of covering another's sins with grace is not simply the work of fiction. Thomas Merton, in his book Wisdom of the Desert, tells us of the experience of an elder in a monastery. Some robbers had entered his cell, gathering the monk's belongings they told him they were going to take everything, and he agreed that they could. They stuffed their bags full and fled. However, the elder noticed that they had left a small bundle hidden from view, so he chased after them to give it to them. The robbers were so amazed at the graciousness of the elder, that they returned everything

back to him, saying, "this one is really a man of God!"

These actions seem so counterintuitive, why would you give so generously to those who are treating you wrong? Well, here's Jesus's answer given in The Message Bible:

Love your enemies. Let them bring out the best in you, not the worst. When someone gives you a hard time, respond with the supple moves of prayer for that person. If someone slaps you in the face, stand there and take it. If someone grabs your shirt, gift-wrap your best coat and make a present of it. If someone takes unfair advantage of you, use the occasion to practice the servant life. No more payback. Live generously."

"Here is a simple rule of thumb for behaviour: Ask yourself what you want people to do for you; then grab the initiative and do it for them! If you only love the lovable, do you expect a pat on the back? Run-of-the-mill sinners do that. If you only help those who help you, do you expect a medal? Gardenvariety sinners do that. If you only give for what you hope to get out of it, do you think that's charity? The stingiest of pawnbrokers does that."

"I tell you, love your enemies. Help and give without expecting a return. You'll never-I promise-regret it. Live out this God-created identity the way our Father lives toward us, generously and graciously, even when we're at our worst. Our Father is kind; you be kind."

### Foodbank changes

All the local foodbanks are short on food and big on customers – business as usual! They are particularly grateful for food donations as the rise in fuel costs is beginning to hit, especially for families who have been 'just about managing'. Tinned ham, biscuits, long-life fruit juice, tea bags, tinned puddings and tinned custard are in short supply right now.

One change: our local foodbanks have reviewed their areas and we have been welcomed into Mid-Cheshire foodbank (based in Winsford/Northwich) both for donations and for food parcels being prepared and delivered to people in Bunbury. All food donated to all foodbanks is eaten by people who need it, so wherever you can make a food donation, it will be used and appreciated; thank you so much for your continuing help. Food placed in the collection box outside the Village Hall will now be taken to collection points for Mid-Cheshire foodbank to support the foodbank that provides for our own village when and if we can.

Finally, the time has come for me to stand down as Volunteer Foodbank Co-ordinator for Bunbury. Could YOU take on this role? It involves preparing and circulating the monthly rota for our volunteer drop-off drivers who empty the donations box; being a point of contact in the village; and preparing posters and publicity for the foodbank from time to time. ## Bunbury Medical Practice news: June

#### Staff Update

As mentioned last month, after nearly two years of being Covid-free amongst our staff, quite a number of our team have been ill with Covid. At the point writing, we are all back and well.

#### Dispensary

You will have no doubt noticed that the outside dispensary window has finally closed, and patients have been invited back into the building to collect their medication. This decision was taken after we took account of updated NHS guidance.

Part of this guidance means that we need patients' cooperation to mitigate risk when attending the practice. We have tried to create separate areas for waiting room and dispensary visitors but as we cannot guarantee that the patient next to you does not have Covid, please bring a mask when attending the surgery and continue to use the hand sanitiser. We would also be grateful if only four patients at a time are in the queue for dispensary.

We have noticed that Friday afternoons is by far our busiest time for medication collection, so you may find it helpful to attend earlier in the week. If you have allowed four working days since requesting your prescription, it should be ready and there is no need to telephone to check.

#### **HRT Supply Issues**

The supply of HRT medication is an ongoing manufacturing issue, however, we would like to reassure our patients that dispensary is managing this situation. In most cases, prescriptions are being fulfilled with the usual brand, but some patients may need to be prescribed an alternative; this applies particularly to patients using Oestrogel.

#### **Reception News**

If you have symptoms of Covid, please avoid attending the surgery, but call reception for advice.

We are planning to move the booking in screen to be between the dispensary and reception counters and we would be grateful if patients would use this whenever possible.

#### PAMAN

The PAMAN remote monitoring system that we mentioned in the April edition, has now gone live. It allows a pharmacist or pharmacy technician to watch patients via a docking bay as they take their medication at home, to ensure that it is taken correctly. There is no cost to the patient for the

device/service as it is funded by the Health and Social Care Government budget.

As mentioned in April, the system allows the pharmacist to see the patient and although a patient cannot see the pharmacist, they can talk to them. It is hoped that such a system will reduce the incidence of patients not taking their medication appropriately and therefore help patients to remain independent. The pharmacist can only see the patient when the patient accepts the incoming call which would be at a pre-arranged time each day (or more times per day if needed). Benefits include:

- Patients are supported in self-medicating correctly.
- The pharmacist can provide advice.
- The pharmacist can manage repeat prescriptions
- Daily calls can provide contact for isolated patients.

#### Frequently Asked Question!

#### "Why should I wear a mask inside Bunbury Medical Practice when mask wearing in general is no longer compulsory?"

Our Partners, Dr John Berry and Dr Nicholas Dixon have given this reply: "Mask wearing is still recommended by Public Health England and the World Health Organisation in GP practices, to help protect patients and staff from exposure to Covid. Covid levels remain high in the community and the wearing of masks remains in place in other healthcare settings, including hospitals.

As people return to a more normal life and access to lateral flow tests is reduced, we cannot guarantee that Covid positive patients are not entering the building to see health care staff or to pick up prescriptions from dispensary.

And so, mask wearing is to protect you as some patients in the building may have covid and not know about it.

It also protects vulnerable patients in the waiting room such as patients on chemotherapy, patients with suppressed immune systems, patients who are elderly and frail as well as pregnant patients.

It also protects the staff. In the past two months more staff at Bunbury have been unwell with Covid and unable to work than in the entire two years of the pandemic combined. This could have impacted on our ability to safely provide a good service for Bunbury patients.

Moving the dispensary inside and a return to a more normal service is a positive move but it does increase the risk of spreading Covid unless people wear masks, use common sense and keep a distance from other people.
