'Go to the ant, study her ways and be wise'.



Countless generations have flourished and passed away since these words were spoken long ago but the good example of the ant is just as well worth following today as it was then. The ant was probably the first co-operator: 'each for

all and all for each' has always been its motto. It forms communities in which all its inhabitants work cheerfully for the common good, each individual has its definite place in the scheme of things and its appointed task to perform.

I was fascinated to watch two ants on the outskirts of the mound hauling a pine twig between them: almost beyond their strength it seemed, for it was in bulk equal to at least ten of its bearers. They pushed and pulled at it, stopping every few seconds to rest, until they were within a few inches of their goal, when a relief party appeared to help them and the task which had overtaxed two was quickly accomplished, with the twig soon arriving in its appointed place.

Although the ant is such a hard worker, it has its playtime too and it will skip about on their hind legs and embrace each other with their antennae in a kind of dance. They also keep green aphids as pets. They install them in special chambers where the aphids can feed quite happily on roots and when the ants want a drink they go up to an aphid and milk it by stroking it gently with their feelers to extract the honeydew which is the sugary fluid the aphids produce.

On one day of the year the ants' nest explodes and thousands of flying ants swarm out and take to the air. This is the ants' marriage flight and all nests in a given area usually erupt at the same time. After mating the males die and most of the females also perish by being eaten by birds or other predators but the females that survive go back to their old nests or begin new colonies. The first thing each one does is to nip off her own wings in case she should be tempted to fly off again in the sunshine and desert her maternal duties. She then lays her eggs and prepares to make a home for the coming generation.

Leaving the shelter of the bay

Did anyone read Rick's article about Dan Brown in the St Boniface service sheet? Rick concluded that we should seek the truth. Nothing new there! Jesus encouraged us to seek the truth, saying that the truth will make us free. How do we seek the truth? And like the Holy Grail, will we find it ? Will we recognise it? And how does this sit with living by faith? Finding truth carries a ring of certainty whilst faith seems ethereal and vague.

Many of my weekends are spent carting Catharine and her boat to assorted stretches of water and bits of sea hoping for the right amount of wind with no rain! Today as I write it's perfect – Abersoch beach in the sun with a good breeze propelling 140 Topper dinghies through the waves as they race well out to sea (out of binocular range!). In February such hopes are optimistic – sailing in flurries of snow has been known! The worst of course is no wind – sitting, waiting and hoping that the

wind will come and of course it will, but will it be in time?

In strong winds weight helps and in light airs it hinders but almost regardless of whether it's blowing force 2 or force 6, the same sailors appear at the front of the fleet.

What does it mean for you?



Church Restoration disruption

Browsing through some old Parish Links we have been kindly lent, we thought this nostalgic snapshot of the life of St.Boniface Church the 1950s might be interesting - if nothing else it certainly proves that "there is nothing new under the sun".

In December 1951 the church was still suffering from war damage. The church building was almost entirely closed as the roof was too dangerous. At weekends the "Public Hall" (is this the Village Hall?-ed) was transformed into a church for the main services while the Ridley Chapel was refurnished for the early morning services. Attendances dropped when the main part of the church was out of use and the Vicar, Maurice Ridgway felt moved to remind locals that "The Public Hall is not a cathedral we know, but the Church is primarily a group of worshipping people, not a building " It was reported that "Funerals can still take place beneath the tower but Baptisms are to take place in the daughter churches and Weddings in Parish Churches adjacent to Bunbury by special arrangement. The reading of Parish Banns cannot now take place as there is no other licensed building for this within the parish." The Restoration appeal fund stood at "£2,972, 9 shillings and 9 pence. The appeal target was £20,000.

A snapshot in time?



In the film, The Passion of the Christ (2004) - a film I would not particularly recommend - there is one very surprising and inspiring moment. We are able to look down on Jesus' death as if we are God. Mel Gibson took his inspiration for it from Salvador Dali's painting, Christ of St John of the Cross, which is painted in sharp perspective and seen from above the cross as though looking down from heaven.

In the film, the camera switches to above the cross, looking down at the scene where Jesus has just died. A

large, solitary teardrop falls from heaven and lands at the foot of the cross with a splash. It could just be a large splash of rain, but **you** know it is God's tear. The wind picks up. There is an earthquake. The rain starts to fall.

We can clearly imagine two persons of the Trinity from that scene.

If you can hold onto that picture and superimpose on it the change in the Roman soldier (Matthew 27), who witnessed Jesus' death, the darkness and the earthquake and was suddenly filled with the knowledge of who Jesus was and is — think of him being filled with the presence of the Holy Spirit — I think you are holding onto a vision of the Trinity. Of course that isn't all there is to the Trinity, but it is perhaps a snapshot of a moment in time when Father, Son and Holy Spirit are all as visible as we are likely to be able to picture them in this life.

Some might say that because this is before Pentecost, the soldier was not filled with the Holy Spirit, just the knowledge of God. Perhaps we should pause on that a moment: just as Jesus was revealed rather than created at his birth (or conception), the Holy Spirit was revealed, not created when sent at Pentecost. The Church's season of Trinity is a long one, but scarcely long enough to get our heads around the mystery of God who is three — but also one.

If you are in Scotland this summer, this picture can be seen at the newly reopened Kelvingrove Art Gallery in Glasgow.



A big thanks to all of you who donated food towards the Hope and Aid Direct (HaAD) Easter 2006 convoy. I am sorry I haven't been able to thank you all personally.

The convoy took 5 days to travel to Kosovo, 5 days to distribute the aid. I was one of the team of 7 who flew straight into Pristina, the capital. 29 volunteers took part in the trip.

HaAD work very closely with Mother Theresa's Organisation who do the ground work in identifying the poorest families in the area.

A total of 80 tonnes of aid was distributed to around 2,000 families, including 600 people living in terrible conditions in the grounds of a disused lead mine. We also delivered and donated medical equipment, stationery for schools, sports kit, a much-needed fire engine to the Kosovo fire service and 1,500 teddy bears!

We also purchased locally £600 of fresh produce on the last day as we were running low on supplies. This was really beneficial as it generates income within the country. The unemployment rate is still around 80% with these families surviving on 40 Euros a month.

Liberation Day

Alex Sanders remembers

The Falkland Islands flag has been flying again in Bunbury this week – at one house at least – to celebrate Liberation Day. 14 June 1982 was the day when the occupying Argentine forces surrendered in the Islands, and the islanders were once again under the protection of the UK, as they very much wanted to be. No longer were they required to speak Spanish, observe a curfew or drive on the right.

Ever since then, Liberation Day has been a public holiday, set aside to remember all those who died in the conflict, thank those who liberated the population, and celebrate the precious freedom to choose one's own government. June is of course a winter month in the South Atlantic, and Liberation Day is typically very cold and often snowy. Despite this, there is always a parade of the local Defence Force, accompanied by soldiers and airmen from the local garrison, and usually a complement of sailors from a visiting warship. Most of Stanley turns out to watch the parade, which is followed by a church service.

Liberation Day holds very personal memories for the islanders all of whom over 24 lived there through the occupation; although there were no atrocities, some islanders were poorly treated and very frightened, particularly those locked in Goose Green community hall for over 100 days. Similarly most islanders befriended British troops, with friendships sustained until today; returning veterans are always given a huge welcome. The names of every British unit that took part in the conflict, and every British serviceman who died are engraved on the Liberation Monument which is in a prominent position in the middle of Stanley; people walk past every day, and remember. The names of the three Falkland Islanders who lost their lives are engraved there too. Further away, outside the town, there is a newly-refurbished Argentine cemetery. Visiting bereaved Argentinian families are gently and kindly treated when they come occasionally to mourn their dead.

But the day really belongs to the British forces, and to the memory of those who died in the fight for liberation. The ideals of freedom and democracy are too important to forget.


