I would have done things better

And so we returned to Poland for the third time. The marriage of our son Steve to Agnieszka in 2001 was followed four years later by the christening of Charlotte on the day after the death of the much loved Polish Pope. Now it was the turn of Hannah Isobel. I didn't understand the words that were said at the christening service, but it didn't stop me from marvelling at the universal language of the church.

Three weeks later we had been transported from the Polish Roman Catholic Cathedral to Guildford Methodist Church, and the christening of another precious grand-child, Alex Michael. Here I was privileged to deliver the sermon on "New Beginnings" at the start of a new life, and a new Methodist year.

Although I had my loved ones around me, I felt very close to those who couldn't be with us on those special days, and as I looked at the new babies, with all their lives ahead of them, I did pause to wonder what the future holds, for them...and for each of us.

In Poland we realised that we were once again part of that country's history

as they prepared to celebrate the twentieth anniversary of the overthrow of communist rule. In an interview, the "Great Electrician" from the Lenin Shipyard in Gdansk, Lech Walesa expressed satisfaction with the part he had played within the "Solidarity" movement, but commented "I would have done things better in retrospect".

In Guildford, my job was to set off with the push-chair and explore the city while getting baby Alex to sleep. We visited the great "new" cathedral, consecrated in 1961 and then on to Guildford Castle, a favourite of Henry III in the thirteenth century! The old and the new, each with so much to contribute. The new baby and the ageing grand-father....and lots of time to think.

Hannah and Alex, named and admitted as Christians through baptism. Given to parents, shared with relations and friends, and blessed by Jesus to follow his example and make a difference in the time that is given to them. And Lech Walesa? What would we have done better if we had our time over again? Is it important? Would it make any difference to the likes of Hannah and

Alex and all the other new babies waiting to grow up and learn from us how to live?

I believe we have a responsibility to Him who gave us life itself, to our community..... and to the children, to help them grow, live and love. We can't get everything right all the time (come and see me in the Young Christians pantomime to prove that!).....but we can try.

The Bible is better than gold

'Therefore I love your commandments above gold, even much fine gold.' (Psalm 119, verse 127)

Gold is one of the group of metals known as the 'noble' metals. That's because they don't dissolve in acids or oxidise in the atmosphere, so unlike any other kinds of treasure, they never rust or perish.

The value of gold comes from its scarcity, its imperishability and its beauty. So we use gold as a kind of metaphor for something of great worth, like the gold medals at the Olympic Games, a golden jubilee or golden wedding, golden oldies and golden opportunities – even as a child who is as good as gold!

Psalm 119, the longest of the psalms, is a hymn of praise to the value of the Scriptures. So we read in verse 12, 'Therefore I love your commandments above gold, even much fine gold'. Yes, the Holy Bible is worth its weight in

gold! That's because those who try to live by it find it the most precious thing in life.

Moreover, the Bible is worth its weight in gold because it contains the word of God. God inspired the writers and when we read the Bible, God can speak directly to us. The Bible gives us the best possible advice on how to live our lives, how to pray and how to know the promise of eternal life.

There's an old saying that before using any gadget you should always read the maker's instructions. God is the maker of our body and our soul, our life and the wonderful world which he has given us to inhabit. To know how to use all those things effectively, we need regularly to read the Maker's instructions.

Truly, we **should** love God's commandments to us above gold, even much fine gold.

Jean explains panto picture

As expected, when we published the picture of the young cast of a sixties panto on the front cover last month, we had quite a response. Jean Healey writes: "They are without doubt the younger members of the well-known Bunbury Pantomime group that flourished in the latish '50s and early '60s. It is certainly not a 'Young Christians' production: the Young Christians were founded in 1982. However, many of the teenagers here will have been likely members of the successful and popular Youth Club run by Canon Ridgway, Bunbury's wellremembered Vicar until his translation to Bowden in 1962.

The Bunbury Pantomime was a celebrated institution in which the

whole village, more or less, took part, and people came from a distance to see performances. It was by no means a youth affair, but involved all ages in both acting and all the backstage activities, and I believe there were sometimes two or three pantomimes produced in a year. Tony Burrows is one who took part; Gordon Jones is another. A sweep of the Wednesday Club would probably reveal many memories!

We have been busy this year celebrating fortieth anniversaries of so many things that began in 1969, but Bunbury was a lively village, with much going on, well before that year. It is good to be reminded of this."

She worked at Peckforton Castle with the disadvantaged and disabled evacuees from London during the latter part of the war, there she made some very good friends. Later she worked as house keeper with Dr Terry in Bunbury at Foxdale. Then she married and became a wonderful wife to Frank, and mum to us two.

In her later years mum, at the age of 75 was still riding around on her moped or Yamaha 75, going about her business

shopping, visiting, she was always busy popping in and out .

She fell off both bikes a few times but never seemed to damage herself much and it never stopped her from riding. She was a fighter till the very end, despite being confined to a wheel chair, which was such a disappointment to her as she could no longer get into her garden nor get onto her bike.

Born in 1917, June's childhood home was in Whalley Range. Educated at Withington Girls' school, and later in Denbigh, June then trained as a teacher. After the War, June moved with her mother to Wilmslow where she taught at a local school for people with disabilities, then at Baguley Hall Infants School in Wythenshawe, where she became headmistress. She remained there until her retirement, and was highly thought of.

Leaving the area, she bought a derelict barn in the Lake District, which she renovated with the help of her brother Jimmy, an architect, and turned it into a beautiful house in a delightful fell-side position. Family and friends have memories of happy holidays in the Lake District, courtesy of June. She took up many new hobbies there including sheep farming, Such was her enthusiasm, she could name the lambs she served for Sunday lunch!

The Lake District weather often made life difficult for her so eventually June decided it was time to move back to Cheshire. Through her friendship with Edgar Parker and his family, she decided to settle in Bunbury. She brought her bees with her, and one

image that her family and friends will never forget, is her description of how she and Edgar, in full beekeeping kit, with veils and all the paraphernalia, drove a car full of beehives down the M6 to Bunbury.

June did many interesting and exotic things in her life; including visiting Czechoslovakia during the height of the cold war; sailing round Iceland and witnessing the emergence of a volcano from the seabed off the Icelandic coast; and sailing on a banana boat to the Caribbean.

June was very happy in Bunbury, and became a valued member of the local community and a rather good bridge player. She was a great communicator, and had the ability to talk to and befriend anybody. She took a keen interest in the lives of her four nephews and their families, and in Joy and Nick Parker and their children, to whom she became an extra grandparent.

We all feel privileged to have known her. As June would have said herself, as she finished leaving a message on family answering machines: "This is Aunty June. Bye Bye".


