To make music in the heart.



Christmas can also be a time to pause and reflect. In fact, that's one of the ways we can unwrap the true gifts of Christmas - a moment of peace in the busyness, a breakthrough of hope in our sadness or a rediscovery of love in a relationship that has become stressed.

God with Us: Your Christmas Journey is a booklet that has been developed by the Church of England. It is designed to help us make the most of quiet moments in a time of year when they may be in short supply. It offers thirteen short and simple reflections that explore what the Christmas story might mean for our lives. There is one for each day from Christmas Eve to New Year's Day, as well as one for each of the four weeks of Advent. Each reflection is accompanied by a picture, a challenge and a short Bible





reading to help us on our journey of faith.

The constant refrain of Christmas, in carols and readings, is that God is with us. In whatever situations we find ourselves this Christmas, God is with us - we need only to turn to him and ask to know his presence.

CARDS FOR GOOD CAUSES

....caring at Christmas with Charity Cards

Cards for Good Causes which sells Christmas cards for more than 30 national charities will be back this year in the Tarporley Baptist and Methodist church. Staffed by local volunteers, the Tarporley shop is open Monday to Saturday, 10am to 4pm until Saturday 2 December. Not only are Christmas Cards an important source of funding for charities, but they also help to raise awareness of their work. At our Tarporley shop you can choose from a fantastic array of charity cards and stock up on Christmas essentials, such as wrapping paper and gift tags. The shop is part of the Cards for Good Causes' national network of over 300 shops. In the past 5 years, charities have received over £20 million from Cards for Good Causes - representing at least 70p in every pound - out of which charities have had to pay for the production and distribution of their Christmas cards and any VAT.

Christmas trees that give support St Luke's Hospice



Pat Ellis becomes Reader Emeritus



On Saturday 21 October Reader Pat Ellis was made Emeritus by Bishop Peter. At the same service, eleven new Readers were licensed and admitted. The preacher at the service was Simon Chesters, Director of Vocations for Liverpool Diocese, but who was in charge of Reader Training in Chester Diocese, when Pat did her training. Pat began with Foundations for Ministry, in 2001 - a year long, part time, general introduction to all types of ministry, then did two years, part-time, of Reader Training. She was licensed in October 2004. Although she has led services at Bunbury and St Jude's, most of her ministry has been at Calveley Chapel, where she regularly leads Family Worship. For many years, Pat has written a column for the Parish Link, usually on a seasonal religious theme.

On becoming emeritus, Readers become licensed to the Bishop rather than the Parish, one can then be deployed around the Diocese, or possibly retire. Pat will not be disappearing from our pages or from work in the parishes. We offer her our congratulations.

Parish Council Pursuits

Ward Councillor Michael Jones and nine Parish Councillors attended the Parish Council meeting on 9 November. Michael announced that he would be resigning shortly, probably by the end of the year. The Chairman thanked Michael for all the help and advice he had provided during his term as our Ward Councillor. Two residents also attended the meeting. Two planning applications were discussed, including one for Brantwood, the house in the village triangle.

A report on the Bonfire and Firework Display was well received, with the interim account showing a profit of £500. Councillors are keen to keep the event 'affordable' and at £4 for adults and £1 for children, 5 to 15yrs, it is the best value anywhere in Cheshire.

Several Councillors and residents have received training from Cheshire Constabulary in the use of our speed gun which we will be deploying shortly in the village.

Residents who live adjacent to the strip of land behind Tweddle Close have responded to our consultation about how to use the land. The consensus is that it should be planted as low density woodland, including some fruit trees. More details to follow in the coming months.

Some potentially good news regarding the Bus Consultation affecting both the Bunbury services. The consultation report has recommended that a 'rural service' be retained but we now have to wait for the council's decision. This may turn out to be a good example of the David and Goliath story...

Don't forget 'Carols Round the Tree,' 6.30pm on Christmas Eve in the village centre. This year we will be accompanied by an ensemble from Crewe Brass, a really excellent local brass band. So Bunbarians get practising with those sweet voices!

Remembrance Sunday











On Remembrance Sunday, Bunbury refused to be daunted by the theft of the Remembrance plaques, with the names of those who lost their lives in two World Wars. A big thank you to Dennis Burrows who organised the temporary plaques and to Johnson's of Nantwich, who produced them.

Bunbury turned out in force to remember those who gave their lives and the families they sadly left behind, both in the parade and in filling the church to overflowing.

During the service, as well as reading out the names of the dead from families in the parish, our young people read evocative war poems and explained their context.

For the service, Martin Cook composed a much appreciated and fitting anthem for our choir to sing, to words from a poem by Laurence Binyon (first page pictured right). In his address, Revd Tim spoke about the theft of our plaques from the memorial gates and our determination to keep remembering the sacrifice of those who gave their lives so that we might live in a free country, in peace.











Give us Two Minutes - Vicky Barrett



I was born and brought up in Hampton, Southwest London, with my four elder siblings, writes Vicky Barrett. They still enjoy teasing me. I studied English at St John's College, Cambridge, and then completed a Post-Graduate Certificate in Education at Leeds University. It was here that I picked up the running bug in a serious way, competing at crosscountry. My teaching career took me to Peterborough, Bristol,

Blackpool, Portsmouth and Stockport, before the call to ordination became so loud that I went to Ripon College Cuddesdon theological college in rural Oxfordshire, and then arrived in Bunbury when I was ordained deacon on 2nd July, 2017.

If you had a motto, what would it be?

I'd use the Bishop Wand School (where I went to school) Bible verse: "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with all thy might." Ecclesiastes 9:10

It's a celebrity beer call - who would you like to invite?

Some heroes whose conversation would be fascinating, a poet and a favourite musician: Archbishop Desmond Tutu, Baroness Warnock, Dame Shirley Williams, Andrew Motion and Neil Hannon (his rendition of "Dear Lord and Father" is amazing).

What would you call your autobiography?

Adventures with a Cup of Tea.

What was your first job?

Group leader for a summer playscheme for children with learning difficulties in Hounslow.

What would you change about Bunbury, if you could?

A regular bus service.

What is the best book you have read to date?

Other than the Bible, you mean?

Narrowing it down to one book as "the best" is tricky. A childhood favourite is "Fifteen Rabbits", by Felix Salten, the author of "Bambi". It is wonderfully unsentimental, making "Watership Down" look very gentle in comparison. Oliver Postgate's autobiography, "Seeing Things", is a moving account of the wise man behind such classic children's programmes as "The Clangers" and is very special. "The Oxford Book of English Verse" is also an

old friend on my bookshelf, and the range of poetry included makes it a particularly sustaining read.

What is your biggest regret?

Life is too short to have regrets. If I were able to give advice to my teenage self, it would be to persevere with piano practice (I didn't) and learn your German grammar thoroughly (life would be far easier if I had done so).

If you were granted one wish, what would it be?

Is peace on Earth too much to ask?

What is one thing people would be surprised to learn about you?

I play cribbage and am on the lookout for other people who would enjoy going "twice round the board".

What would you like to achieve most over the next 12 months?

To get to know more of the wonderful people in the parish. I have been overwhelmed by the kindness and friendliness of those I've met so far. To get back into a good routine with my running and do some races wearing my new Tattenhall Runners vest.


Bunbury Royal British Legion skittles match 2017

14 fascinating facts about Suriname



- 1. In both area and population, Suriname is the smallest country in mainland South America.
- 2. Suriname's earliest inhabitants were the Surinen Indians, after whom the country is named. By the 16th century they had been supplanted by other South American Indians. Spaniards came to Suriname in the 16th century, because they've been in search of gold, however they did not stay long since they did not found any but by 1602 the Dutch began to settle the land, followed by the English. The English transferred sovereignty to the Dutch in 1667 (the Treaty of Breda) in exchange for New Amsterdam (New York).
- 3. Suriname became independent from the Netherlands on November 25, 1975.
- 4. Dutch is still the official language of Suriname, however no fewer than 20 languages are spoken.
- 5. The main export of Suriname is bauxite from which aluminium is extracted. However, industries such as ecotourism are also growing, while other major exports include bananas, shrimp and rice.
- 6. Thanks to large-scale immigration to South America from Asia in the 19th century, Hindustanis form the largest ethnic group in Suriname.
- 7. There is only one cinema in Suriname.
- 8. Since 1960, when they first entered the Olympics, Suriname have won two medals, a gold and a bronze,

both won by the swimmer Anthony Nesty in 1988 and 1992. Suriname's national and favourite sport is Soccer (football), they never won a major soccer event though. However several of the most famous Dutch footballers, including Ruud Gullit and Nigel de Jong are of Surinamese descent

9. They drive on the left in Suriname. The only other South American country to do so is Guyana.

10. Tropical rainforests make up about 80% of Suriname's total Landscape. The highest point in Suriname is Juliana Top at 1,230m (4035ft). It is a country very rich in flora and fauna. There are several Protected Areas of Suriname. The largest of these is the Central Suriname Nature Reserve, a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

11. The Suriname toad (pipa pipa) is about five inches long and almost flat. Its feet are webbed and it has tiny eyes, no teeth and no tongue. Also famous is the giant sea turtle or leatherback turtle.

12. About half the population of Suriname live in its capital city Paramaribo, which has more people than the next nine cities put together.

- 13. One of the most distinctive foods that you can enjoy in Suriname is Pom, which reveals the blend of cultures that have helped to form this country, with Jewish and Creole origins. Pom is a dish that contains guite a bit of meat, which makes it a dish for a special occasion in Surinamese culture, and is usually reserved for a birthday party or similar celebration. The dish is made in a high sided dish with layers of the local tayer plant sandwiching chicken pieces, and then covered in a sauce made with tomatoes, onions, nutmeg and oil before being cooked in the oven.
- 14. Adults under the age of 30 are not allowed to get married in Suriname without a written permission from their parents.



Malcolm Dodd: 7th July 1948 - 25th October 2017

Malcolm Dodd - also known as "Plodder", or "Doddo", lived for over 20 years in Alpraham. He cut quite a figure along Tarporley High Street, wearing bell-bottomed trousers with paisley inserts, and bells. A popular man, he was willing to offer help and advice to many people, especially with cars, even when he became very unwell.

He was born and brought up as an only child in Tarporley, where his father was a Fire Officer. He sang in St Helen's church choir and played for the school cricket team as a boy, and he enjoyed a bit of mischief. He left school at 16 for an apprenticeship as a mechanic, but an allergy to oil in the lift pumps saw him move on to be a driver for Stocknall Transport, later to become part of Wincanton. 25 years of driving dairy tankers saw him achieve a long-service award, but did not cure him of a dislike of milk.

He met his wife Susanne, who was working at the labs at Unigate dairy, as he delivered the milk. They were married at Northwich Registry Office on 13th March, 1976, enjoying 41 years and eight months together. Their three children, Peter, Mark and Holly, recall a dad who took great pride in

their achievements and who brought them up to share his love of concerts.

Music was just one of a huge range of Malcolm's interests. He enjoyed all kinds of music - including Jimi Hendrix and Clannad, which were played at his funeral. He loved vintage machinery, rebuilding a Vauxhall Victor with his son Mark, and Massey Ferguson tractors and, in smaller-scale, model aircraft. He was an avid reader, and was well-travelled. He had several greenhouses and sheds, where his vegetables were his pride and joy. Malcolm was a great conversationalist. He would give everyone a chance, although by no means naïve.

It was a huge blow when Malcolm's health began to deteriorate. He suffered from pancreatic cancer for the last 14 months of his life, receiving treatment from the Liverpool Royal Hospital, the Clatterbridge Cancer Centre and the Countess of Chester Hospital, before spending his last five days at home as he wished. The Clatterbridge Centre and The Pancreatic Unit at the Linda McCartney Centre at the Royal Liverpool will benefit from donations in his memory.

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
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
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






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
